Statement of intent

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Reducing the attendance gap which has increased between PP and non-PP during the pandemic.
2	Close progress gap between PP and non-PP students at Key Stage 3 and 4.
3	Eradicate the behaviour data gap with a disproportionate amount of Cs and exclusions impact disadvantaged students. Device support for home learning.
4	Strategies to support mental health and pastoral issues which impact disadvantaged students disproportionately often impacting aspirations.
5	Parental engagement with school limited with the disadvantaged cohort such as attendance at parents' evenings.

B To improve the engagement and achievement for our mostvulnerable students by providing pastoral and welfare support for students with, for example, emotional or social issues.

Identifying barriers to learning so students can be personally supported by different in school and out-of-school agencies. Always tailored to suit individual needs. Support of highly skilled Home School Liaison Officer (HSLO) in collaboration with **AHT Raising** Achievement for high need PP students plus the use of CT28/Pastoral bases provision if and when required.

Students seen by Just Be:

Over 30 students in KS5 and over 10 students so far in KS4. KS3 just starting this year (2022)

CPOMS and Pastoral logs with details around interventions.

Inspire academy 2022/23 - vulnerable and behaviour cohorts plus one to one mentoring.

This is an even greater priority than ever before. JLA hub set up for crucial support for the most vulnerable. Just Be continues in sixth form and Wellbeing in Mind via the NHS in the main school coordinated by ELD and TPB. Pastoral logs/CPOMS continue with key information incorporated into ClassCharts.

Greater communications with home needed for some of our most vulnerable with the aim of having more meetings with key staff when needed this year via the core team involved in engagement meetings. Also prioritise communicating the positives – very important.

C/D Improved behaviour data and statistics for PP students in school.

Offer opportunities to PP students to increase aspiration overall and increase engagement

PMs/LLMs/AHT work with key students to reduce behaviour incidents and improve behaviour for learning.

PP students prioritised for behaviour programme via Karen Cruise.
Tracking and monitoring of engagement in clubs.

Reduced exclusion figures this year and alternative systems in place such as working in offices. C4 reduced due to Covid-19 restriction therefore dramatically reduced C4 figures. This system will continue this year therefore reducing time out of lessons. Enhanced behaviour plans via ClassCharts will support the PP cohort.

All students need to be in school but particularly disadvantaged and SEND pupils. New behaviour system with new behaviour lead with a focus on integration/being in lessons. No all day C4 and more intervention to preempt further behaviour decline.

Focus and drive on pp behaviour statistics being proportionately in line with non-pp.

Students will continue to be prioritised for careers support and work experience placements when they resume.

E/F To continue to offer enhanced attendance support and engage students in learning beyond the end of the school day via supported study. To engage PP students in extracurricular activities.
